City of American Canyon's Public Art Program

n April 18, the American Canyon City Council will adopt a Proclamation supporting Napa Valley Arts in April, and consider a Public Arts Program for the City.

The new program will establish an Arts Committee that will oversee the program, including recommendations for art purchases and installations.

Although no funding is budgeted, having a program, and in particular, identifying sites for public art (see the accompanying map), will help when grants, private donations, or fund raising efforts (such as ACAF's drive to help build the 911 Memorial) show up and we need to act right away.



The enabling resolution originally focused on art purchases, but Olivia Dodd, CEO of Arts Council Napa Valley, pointed out that temporary installations are less expensive and avoid long-term maintenance costs. The Artwalk in Napa, for example, only cost \$10-15,000 for approximately 7 pieces of art. Acquisition would probably exceed \$100,000!

We encourage all our members to show up at the Council meeting on April 18—show your support for public art in American Canyon!
